NOTICE OF SUSPENSION

Dear Mr. Arndt,

This letter confirms verbal notification by Mr. Salah Ibrahim, Deputy District Manager (DDM), to (b) (6) at approximately 3:15 P.M. on October 9 2019, of the Food Safety and Inspection Service's (FSIS) decision to suspend the assignment of Inspection Program Personnel (IPP) for the Slaughter Hazard Analysis and Critical Control Point (HACCP) process at **Stoney Point, Inc. (Est. 9646)**, located in Littlestown, PA. FSIS is issuing this notification in accordance with the Rules of Practice, Title 9 of the Code of Federal Regulations (9 CFR) Part 500.3(b).

Findings/Basis for Action

Today, October 9, 2019, at approximately 1:20 P.M., (b) (6) was observing stunning effectiveness and observed an egregious mis-stunning of a large sow in the stun box. The sow was freely standing with an Establishment employee inside the stun box. The Establishment employee used the hand held captive bolt to make a stunning attempt. The Food Inspector observed that the captive bolt of this first stunning attempt penetrated the skull of the sow. The sow remained standing and vocalizing. Another Establishment employee handed the backup captive bolt to the Establishment employee inside the stun box and a second stunning attempt was made. The sow remained standing and vocalizing after this second attempt. An Establishment employee left the slaughter floor to notify the (b) (6) that they needed the pistol. (b) (6) brought the pistol to the kill floor and handed it to an Establishment Employee. The CSI and Food Inspector exited the building. The CSI stood outside the slaughter and heard four shots made on the sow with the pistol. After each of the first three shots with the pistol the sow remained vocalizing. When the fourth pistol shot was made the sow was rendered unconscious. On post mortem, the IIC observed that the sow's skull was penetrated with six holes, clustered together. She instructed Establishment management and employees to halt further slaughter operations. (b) (6) tagged the stun box, with U.S. Rejected tag NO. B37389150, to stop the slaughter process. The District Office was notified. The Establishment operates under a Robust Systematic Approach and has had no recent Humane Handling concerns. Because of the number of stunning attempts

required to render the hog unconscious, the District Office decided the Enforcement to be a Suspension.

For captive bolt stunning, Regulation 9 CFR Part 313.15 requires that the captive bolt stunner shall be applied to the livestock in accordance with this section so as to produce immediate unconsciousness in the animals before they are shackled, hoisted, thrown, cast, or cut.

For firearm stunning, Regulation 9 CFR Parts 313.16 requires that the firearms shall be employed in the delivery of a bullet or projectile into the animal in accordance with this section so as to produce immediate unconsciousness in the animal by a single shot before it is shackled, hoisted, thrown, cast, or cut. The animal shall be shot in such a manner that they will be rendered unconscious with a minimum of excitement and discomfort.

Background/Authority

The Federal Meat Inspection Act (FMIA) [21 U.S.C. 603 sec. 3. (b)] states, "for the purpose of preventing the inhumane slaughtering of livestock, the Secretary shall cause to be made, by inspectors appointed for that purpose, an examination and inspection of the method by which cattle, sheep, swine, goats, horses, mules, or other equines are slaughtered and handled in connection with slaughter in the slaughtering establishments inspected under this Act. The Secretary may refuse to provide inspection to a new slaughtering establishment or may cause inspection to be temporarily suspended at a slaughtering establishment if the Secretary finds that any cattle, sheep, swine, goats, horses, mules, or other equines have been slaughtered or handled in connection with slaughter at such establishment by any method not in accordance with Sections 1901 to 1906 of Title 7 until the establishment furnishes assurances satisfactory to the Secretary that all slaughtering and handling in connection with slaughter of livestock shall be in accordance with such a method." In addition, under prohibited acts, 21 U.S.C. 610 sec 10 (b), "No person, firm or corporation shall, with the respect to any cattle, sheep, swine, goats, horses, mules, and other equines, or any carcasses, parts of carcasses, meat or meat food products of any such animals slaughter or handle in connection with slaughter any such animals in any manner not in accordance with sections 1901 to 1906 of Title 7."

7 U. S. C. 1901

Humane Methods of Slaughtering Act 7 USC 1901 states, "The Congress finds that the use of humane methods in the slaughter of livestock prevents needless suffering; results in safer and better working conditions for persons engaged in the slaughtering industry; brings about improvement of products and economies in slaughtering operations; and produces other benefits for producers, processors, and consumers which tend to expedite an orderly flow of livestock and livestock products in interstate and foreign commerce. It is therefore declared to be the policy of the United States that the slaughtering of livestock and the handling of livestock in connection with slaughter shall be carried out only by humane methods."

7 U. S. C. 1902

The Humane Methods of Slaughtering Act 7 USC 1902 states, "No method of slaughtering or handling in connection with slaughtering shall be deemed to comply with the public policy of the United States unless it is humane."

Under the authority of the above Acts, FSIS has prescribed rules and regulations required for establishments producing meat and poultry products, including the requirements pertaining to humane slaughter of livestock, as required by 9 CFR 313, and other matters. The Rules of Practice describe the types of enforcement action that FSIS may take to include a withholding action and/or suspension, with or without prior notification, and for filing a complaint to withdraw a Grant of Federal Inspection.

Please provide this office with a written response concerning this NOS by addressing the following:

- Evaluate and identify the nature and cause of the incident.
- Explain the specific reason(s) why the event occurred.
- Describe the specific actions taken to eliminate the cause of the incident.
- Describe specific planned actions that you will take to prevent future reoccurrences.

Provide associated records that include monitoring and verification activities your establishment will use to ensure that changes are effectively implemented. We will determine further action, if any, based on your response.

You are reminded that as an operator of a federally inspected plant you are expected to comply with FSIS regulations and to take appropriate corrective actions to prevent the inhumane treatment of animals at your establishment. Please be advised you have the right to appeal this matter. If you wish to appeal, you should contact:

The rules of practice were published in the Federal Register, Vol.64, no 228, on November 29, 1999. As specified in section 500.5(d), should you request a hearing, FSIS will file a complaint that will include a request for an expedited hearing. 
