Dear Dr. Peterson:

The Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS) has completed its review of the petition you submitted on behalf of the National Chicken Council (NCC) dated March 1, 2019 and assigned petition number 19-01. The petition requests that FSIS amend 9 CFR 381.82 to treat lesions suspected of being caused by avian leukosis as a trimmable condition rather than a condition that requires condemnation of the entire carcass. The petition also requests that FSIS eliminate regulations that require FSIS offline inspectors to check the viscera of the first 300 birds of each new flock in young chicken establishments operating under the New Poultry Inspection System (NPIS) to determine if the flock is affected with Avian Leukosis (9 CFR 381.36(f)(3) and 381.76(b)(6)(iv)). As noted in your petition, avian leukosis does not present a food safety concern.

After careful consideration, FSIS has decided to grant your petition. We have determined that current scientific evidence supports treating avian leukosis as a trimmable condition and that the actions requested in your petition would reduce regulatory burdens on the industry. A description of the proposed rulemaking initiated in response to your petition is included in the Spring 2020 Unified Agenda of Regulatory and Deregulatory Actions.¹
