Why is it Important to be Professional?

- To maintain Agency standards
- To retain the confidence of the public
- You represent the Agency in the eyes of the public





What are Examples of Unethical Conduct?

Working in an establishment where immediate family members are employed

Making unauthorized commitments or promises that involve binding the government

Accepting gifts or engaging in business or financial dealings with regulated establishments or their employees

Using public office for private gain

Engaging in outside
employment or activities,
including speaking or
negotiating for employment,
that conflict with official
government duties and
responsibilities

Receiving anything of value given with the intent to influence the performance of official duties

What are Consequences of Unethical Conduct?

- Caution or Warning
- Official Letter of Reprimand
- Suspension without Pay
- Demotion
- Removal
- Non-pay Absence Status



Ethics and the HATCH Act

What is the purpose of the HATCH Act?

"...to ensure that federal programs are administered in a nonpartisan fashion, to protect federal employees from political coercion in the workplace, and to ensure that federal employees are advanced based on merit and not based on political affiliation."

SCENARIO A ROMANTIC RELATIONSHIPS

The CSI promptly reports the incident to the IIC.

- Consistently follow Agency policy to carry out your responsibilities
- Use the 14 Principles of Ethical Conduct
- Maintain high levels of skill, competency, ethics, and courtesy


