FSIS Intends to Begin a Phased Roll-out of Egg Products Plant FSAs

FSIS intends to begin a phased roll-out of the Public Health Risk Evaluation (PHRE) and Food Safety Assessment (FSA) methodologies to egg products plants. FSIS intends to start with PHREs of four egg products plants in the Des Moines District—that district has the greatest concentration of egg products plants—and select plants with different production processes. FSIS will then expand the egg products plant FSA methodology to other Districts. FSIS will use the PHREs to evaluate current and historical production data associated with an egg product plant's operation to determine if an enforcement action, FSA, or no action, is warranted. When warranted, FSIS will conduct FSAs at those plants, using the same five to seven production day time-frame used for meat and poultry establishments. FSIS will broadly follow the PHRE and FSA methodologies currently being applied at meat and poultry establishments.

The Enforcement, Investigations and Analysis Officers (EIAO) will use a tool specific for egg products to verify food safety system compliance with the egg products regulations (9 CFR 590) and to identify and associate findings, leading to a logical and supportable outcome recommendation.

Updated Slaughter Compliance Guidelines for Beef Slaughtering Establishments is Available

FSIS has posted an updated compliance guideline entitled, "Compliance Guideline for Minimizing the Risk of Shiga Toxin-producing *Escherichia Coli* (STEC) and *Salmonella* in Beef (including Veal) Slaughter Establishments 2017" that provides best practices at beef slaughter establishments. This guideline provides beef and veal slaughter establishments with information concerning best practices at slaughter that they can use to prevent, eliminate, or reduce levels of fecal and associated microbiological contamination, specifically contamination with Shiga Toxin Producing *E. coli* (STEC) and *Salmonella*.

FSIS first issued related guidance in September 2002 and has been updating the information to help beef slaughter establishments be aware of the most current scientific information, as well best practices across the industry. This guideline is based on the best scientific and practical considerations and does not represent requirements that must be met. FSIS invites interested people to submit comments on this compliance guideline over the next 60 days.
